


normal circle. This will begin at 8 pm on Tuesday night.

DR. SCOT MCKNIGHT -

A world-renowned speaker, writer, professor and equipper of the Church. He is a recognized authority on the historical Jesus, early Christianity, and the New Testament. His blog, Jesus Creed, is a leading Christian blog.

A sought after speaker, he has been interviewed on several radio and television programs as well as spoken at numerous local churches, conferences, colleges, and seminaries in the United States and around the world. Scot McKnight is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature and the Society for New Testament Studies. McKnight's books have been translated into Chinese, Korean, Russian, and Portuguese. He is Professor of New Testament at Northern Seminary.

Al is the co-author of Linking Arms, Linking Lives: How Urban-Suburban Partnerships Can Transform Communities, along with Ron Sider, John Perkins and Wayne Gordon, author of Missional Preaching: Embrace, Engage, Transform, and co-editor of Honoring the Generations: Learning with Asian North American Congregations, with Sydney Park and Soong-Chan Rah.

COLLECTIVE SESSIONS

#1: SCRIPTURE'S GRAND NARRATIVE – KINGDOM, MISSION, & WORLD SCOT MCKNIGHT

Mission in the world, even if it requires discernment of what God is doing in our local community, is anchored in Scripture and God's clear message about what God is doing. God's mission from the beginning to the end is to form God's People — Israel, Church, Kingdom. This session will explore the centrality of the Church, the local church in particular, for discerning God's mission in the world today.

#2: FROM THE LIVING WORD TO WRITTEN WORD – AND BACK AGAIN BILL WEBB & DAVID FITCH

The Authority of Scripture: What Does It (Not) Mean?

With much appreciation for N. T. Wright's The Last Word (2005) and its expanded treatment in Scripture and the Authority of God (2011), we will journey into the precarious subject of what it means to embrace the authority of Scripture. Adding Webb's "lesser authoritative lens" and a smattering of sample texts—Sabbath, monogamy, war rape, rod and whip, etc.—we will open up our own "biblical authority" suitcases and dialogue about their contents. Irony and intrigue abound.

Proclamation versus Explanation: Refusing to Defend The Authority of Scripture for the Sake of Inviting The World into It

Often we get caught up in apologetic concerns when it comes to the authority of Scripture. This sets into motion a dynamic, which not only undercuts the authority of Scripture in the world, but sets us over against those who have not yet believed. Instead, we need to see Scripture as an extension of the work of God in the world. It is God's unfolding Narrative of His Mission. It has been given to us and extended an authority by Jesus Christ Himself by the Spirit through the church for the world. The authority of Scripture therefore is inextricable from the Lordship of Jesus Christ. It is only as we live in His mission (the Story), under His authority as Lord, that we can then proclaim his message as witness to what God is doing to save the whole world. Only in embodied witness, is Scripture's authority is made manifest to the world. Rather than defend it then and divide ourselves from the world, we only need proclaim it and invite in.

#3: RE-READING THE BIBLE REDEMPTIVELY BILL WEBB & SCOT MCKNIGHT

A Redemptive-Movement Hermeneutic

Drawing upon Slaves, Women and Homosexuals, Moving Beyond the Bible to Theology, and Corporal Punishment in the Bible, this plenary session will explore a redemptive-movement hermeneutic. We will discuss what it means to read the text not only literarily (up and down the page) but also redemptively within its ancient social context (the ancient-world soil and setting). Here is the surprising find: reading the Bible redemptively means that we hear the text in a dramatically different way. With a focus on slavery texts we will do a listening experiment that spans both legitimate academic inquiry and a street-level dialogue with our neighbors.

How the Bible Works

How we read the Bible determines how we live the Bible's mission. A more thoughtful and self-conscious approach to Bible reading includes watching "how the Bible works" so this session will look at the divorce regulations of the Bible to illustrate how the Bible actually works. What we learn is that the Bible is not a set of rules but a vision of how kingdom people live in the world in the here and now.

#4: LETTING THE BIBLE READ YOU MANDY SMITH

If the Word of God is living and active, why does Scripture sometimes feel dead and boring? Has it lost its relevance? Or have we, in our efforts to tame it, killed it? We all bring our own agendas to Scripture and ask it to perform for us. If we can set aside our own agendas, we can prepare for the challenge and thrill of handling a vibrant, writhing thing. And being handled by it.

#5: SCRIPTURE FORMED COMMUNITY: READING THE BIBLE THROUGH MISSIONAL EYES AL TIZON

When we claim that the whole Bible is a missional text we are not imposing an artificial framework. Indeed, the Bible itself invites a missional hermeneutic. The common strand interweaved from Genesis to Revelation that compels us to read the scriptures through missional eyes is the strand of the reign or kingdom of God. This session explores a way to read, interpret and preach the missional scriptures by a fresh understanding of the kingdom of God. Biblical preaching is kingdom preaching is missional preaching.y it.

#6: COMMUNICATING THE BIBLE IN AN AGE OF GLOBALIZATION MANDY SMITH & AL TIZON

Lack and Longing: Rediscovering a Lost Strength

Things have changed so much over the centuries, we could almost be a different species from the Bible's original audiences. One of our biggest challenges, as Christian leaders, is knowing both our text and our context so well that we can connect them. Paul was skilled at finding a way cultures longed for what the Gospel offered. What longings would he find in our culture? Could it be that something Christians should be good at (but have forgotten) connects deeply with a need in our culture? How can we rediscover this lost way of life so we can bring it to our culture?

Proclaiming the Gospel in an Age of Globalization

Globalization is an interpretation of the world that is based on the collision of cultures, economies, religions, values, etc. Assuming that it is a credible interpretation of reality today, what are its implications for the church? What relevance is our gospel message in the age of globalization and how do we proclaim it faithfully? Although a single session will not be able to cover the complexities of these types of questions, this session will touch on what the church needs to become competent in so that the gospel retains its relevance in the world.

FOCUSED SESSIONS #1

READING THE WAR TEXTS – REDEMPTIVELY BILL WEBB

RM / MINNESOTA

The so-called "holy war" texts of Scripture include disturbing scenes from genocide (the total kill of all men, women and children) to grabbing good-looking women captives as wives. Unfortunately, the traditional answers [holy God, evil Canaanites, etc.] simply do not work at the level of military ethics. They do not stand up to rigorous ethical scrutiny. By continuing to answer objections with the traditional answers, we have been banging square pegs in round holes. This session will look at some of the emerging, better answers for reading these war texts redemptively. *

THE GOALS OF MISSIONAL PREACHING

RM / AMERICA A

AL TIZON

The well-known adage, "If you aim at nothing, you'll hit it every time," is true for preaching as well. The fact that the language of objectives and goals is not used very much in homiletical discussions should be of concern to us. What do we hope to accomplish in our preaching? This workshop discusses seven goals, which when striven for, help determine the theological, ethical and practical—in a word, missional—shape of the church.

BOASTING IN OUR WEAKNESS & THE POWER OF THE WORD MANDY SMITH

RM / AMERICA B

DEBATING, DECIDING, OR DISCERNING? SEEKING SPIRITUAL DIRECTION IN THE COMMUNITY OF THE SPIRIT

ALEXANDER, KEASLER, & HOLSCLAWS

The New Testament account states that the church is a new society, led and ruled by Jesus. This means that the church makes decisions in a way that is unique and peculiar. This workshop explores what it means and looks like for the church to be a "pneumocarcy" (rule of the Spirit), rather than a "democracy" (rule of the majority) or an "autocracy" (rule of one). What does it mean for a local community of faith to discern God's will together? How can the church listen to God's Spirit and come to a place of consensus around potentially divisive issues? Can the local church make decisions in which they say "it seemed good to us and the Spirit"? (Acts 15)

OUR CHURCHES IN GOD'S STORY: HOW THE KINGDOM "EXPANDS" SCOT MCKNIGHT RM / OHIO

We live in the already/not yet reality of God's Kingdom. What we often miss, however, is that the church exists within this same dynamic. Ironically, when we compare the present kingdom and the present church, or the future kingdom and the future church, we come out with near identities.

This fundamental identity shift has significant implications for how the church carries out her kingdom mission in the world today. In order to "make the world a better place" or "pursue the common good," we often ethicize, secularize, or politicize the church's mission, severing it from God's Kingdom mission. Instead, we must align with the King himself who came to build the kingdom/church. This workshop will seek to orient and expand these reflections within God's story.

FOCUSED SESSIONS #2

READING THE WOMEN TEXTS – REDEMPTIVELY BILL WEBB

RM / MINNESOTA

The journey of Scripture is one of movement towards egalitarianism —

equality of male and female—but within an ancient context where patriarchy ruled. This workshop will explore both the problematic treatment of women within the biblical text (far from an ultimate ethic) as well as the more redemptive side of the equality story. We will also discuss the practical question of what it means to engage our multicultural society and our divergent church context today. Do we whisper, scream or do a little of both?

THE WORD ON THE STREET: PREACHING JUSTICE & RECONCILIATION AL TIZON RM / AMERICA A

One of the goals of missional preaching is to guide God's people to an understanding and practice of biblical justice and reconciliation. But what is justice? What is reconciliation? And what does it mean for a church to be committed to these things? This workshop will address these questions and offer principles that will help leaders to preach and teach in a way that moves the church toward becoming a just and reconciling people.

HIS AND HER.MENEUTICS

FRANK AND CAROLYN CUSTIS JAMES.

It is a sad reality that for millennia professing Christians have been killing other professing Christians over their respective interpretations of the Bible. Things have greatly improved in our modern world but the Bible still can become a dangerous weapon of abuse, coercion and marginalization. Nowhere has our interpretation of the Bible created more conflict than the subject of gender. Part of the reason has been the dominance of his-meneutic and the absence of her-meneutic. This seminar will explore the good, bad and ugly hermeneutics among Evangelicals. The goal will be to gain a missional perspective on how we approach the Bible.

THE (OTHER) KINGDOM OF JESUS: HOW JESUS REDEFINES KINGDOM IN SCRIPTURE

SCOT MCKNIGHT

RM / OHIO

The character of a king determines the character of the kingdom. The "character" of Jesus can be seen in the titles used for him – Son of Man, Son of God, and Messiah – titles that evoke the story of one exalted to be King following suffering and death. Thus, the kingdom becomes cruciform by virtue of the character of King Jesus. Kingdom citizens then are Jesus-redeemed humans, people who have been saved from sin, liberated from cosmic powers, and who are conquering systemic evil through the

power of the Spirit. This workshop will explore the nature the kingdom in Scripture, specifically the kingdom rooted in the person of Jesus himself and in those who claim to follow him.

BEYOND EGALITARIANISM & COMPLEMENTARIANISM: THE KINGDOM CALL FOR WOMEN IN MINISTRY DAVID FITCH

RM / AMERICA B

This session explores the New Testament view of women in light of the Kingdom, the gifts of the Holy Spirt in the Church, and the already/but not yet eschatology of Scripture. Once we see church leadership and gender dynamics in these terms, we discover that the unresolved conflicts in Scripture over women in ministru are resolved and a wonderful Kingdom dynamic is unleashed in regard for men and women leading out of their giftedness in mutual submission to one another.

FOCUSED SESSIONS #3

READING THE HOMOSEXUAL TEXTS – REDEMPTIVELY **BILL WEBB**

YEAR IN REVIEW

Looking Back – Looking Forward: Life in Ecclesia in 2013 – 2014.

"Hold it steady" would be an accurate way of describing the path of Ecclesia in 2013. While it was a tremendous year of progress and fruitfulness for many churches within our network, it was also a year of incredible transition for the network as a whole.

Last January, JR Woodward officially stepped down from his role on staff with Ecclesia. With many thanks for his role in helping to develop Ecclesia since the beginning, we wished him well as he embarked on the next chapter in his life's story. We are excited to see how God uses him with the v3 movement and are glad that there will be some ways to partner together down the road. With JR's departure, our central role in launching Missio Alliance, and figuring out God's plan for our network in this new season, I found it difficult to do much other than keep things steady in 2013. Of course, on top of all this, my family underwent a major move from Richmond, VA to near Baltimore, MD and that meant that the Ecclesia offices also underwent a major move.

In spite of these realities, there are still many things to be grateful to God for within Ecclesia this past year. With Ecclesia as the central organizer in the launch of Missio Alliance, we shouldered a heavy but important load in getting this new initiative off the ground. While the launch gathering was a great success, with nearly 800 people attending in person or online, we are more pleased with the new movement that is coming together to help provide a substantive, forward looking, but evangelically rooted framing of the most pressing cultural and theological issues of our day. We have met many new friends and forged several significant relationships through this work. There is a tremendous excitement and willingness to partner with Missio Alliance and for that we are blessed.

Shortly after the inaugural Missio Alliance gathering we held what was quite possibly, our strongest church planters training to date. It seems that each year we make this same statement – and it is true – but the diversity of

models, the "normalness" of the church planting ethos, and the relational and practical credibility, make the Genesis Training a unique environment in today's wider church context. A few strong regional gatherings helped to round out the fall and prepare the way for what we expect to be a fruitful 2014.

As we look ahead to this coming year, we personally believe that Ecclesia is heading toward a new and significantly stronger place. Last summer, as we continued to weigh the direction Ecclesia should take following JR Woodward's transition, I clearly sensed the Lord tell me "3 people at 3 days a week for 3 years" is what we would need to see the network move to the place God would want. It is important to know, especially if you are an Ecclesia Network church, that this is a staffing arrangement that we cannot afford. Yet, the word was clear and in discussion with others, was affirmed. After several months of conversation, we are excited to have J.R. Briggs and Bob Hyatt join our staff team. J.R. will take over the role vacated by JR Woodward focusing on leadership and congregational formation. Bob will focus on overseeing some of the various aspects of church planting that are part of Ecclesia's ministry. Both will be striving to increase the connection between the churches in Ecclesia to the network itself and to other congregations. We are incredibly excited about the new doorways this will open up for Ecclesia and how it will support our growth in the future. Our prayerful expectation is that God will take our step of faith in drawing on our savings to pay for these expansions that the financial dimension of Ecclesia will grow in the next few years to pay for this new arrangement. Bob and J.R. join Jane Linton (Administrator), Dave Fitch (Theologian-in-Residence), and Chris Backert (National Director) to round out the staff team.

In addition to new staff members, we officially welcome both new board members, regional coordinators, and new congregations to Ecclesia in 2014. Aaron Graham of the District Church, Keas Keasler of Rhythm in Miami, and Jeanette Staats of New Life Christian Fellowship in Blacksburg all officially joined the board in December.

Mike Hollenbach of the Bridge Community Church in Easton, PA is our new

regional coordinator in the Northeast (taking over for J.R. Briggs).

We also gladly welcome new churches to Ecclesia early in 2014 including Engage Community Church in Carlisle, PA (pastored by Jon Hand), Next Gen Church in Princeton, NJ (pastored by Mia Chang), and a new church plant in Pasadena, CA (pastored by Kyle Sears). There are several others in the pipeline and a few larger partnership conversations with other like groups that we are continuing to explore.


As we look to the year ahead, our primary goal this year is increase the connectivity of the relationships to both pastors and churches within Ecclesia. J.R. and Bob are proactively touching base with many of the church staff within Ecclesia and they are already planning several visits to congregations. As many of you will know, Ecclesia as been the context for doctoral research that JR Rozko has been conducting over the last three years. One of the practical implications of that research was a proposal for the formation of "Communities of Practice." as a means of advancing the formation of Ecclesia pastors and churches as well as the reach of our network. Ecclesia's Board is excited to move this vision forward! The first one to be launched will be focused on the Spiritual Formation and Discipleship of Children, led by Cyd Holsclaw, later this year. We also want to strengthen the coaching support that is available within our network and will be holding a training for coaches this Fall. Contact J.R. Briggs or Bob Hyatt if you are interested. As always, we are looking forward to the National Gathering and the upcoming church planters training from May 12-16 at a new location in Baltimore, MD. Stay tuned for regional gatherings (both large and small) this year as well.

As I look with hope toward 2014, I sense with confidence that Ecclesia is ready to move to the next place on our journey. I am ever so grateful to those who have journeyed with us and the many friends we have made along this way. Many of you know that Dallas Willard, one of the dear friends of Ecclesia, passed away earlier this year. There are so many things that Dallas said which resonate profoundly to me, but as I close out this yearly review, one of his prayers come to mind for all my family in Ecclesia.

"I pray that you would have a rich life of joy and power, abundant with supernatural results, with a constant, clear vision of never-ending life in God's World before you, and of the everlasting significance of your work day by day. A radiant life and a radiant death."

MAP / INTERIOR CAMPUS MAP


