TOWARDS ZERO TB DEATHS IN SOUTHERN AFRICAN MINING COMMUNITIES

Mine workers in Southern Africa have some of the highest rates of tuberculosis (TB) in the world. The epidemic is driven by high levels of HIV-infection, crowded living conditions and exposure to silica dust.

The issue is regional. The mining industry in South Africa is heavily dependent on migrant workers from surrounding countries. Men travelling to work in the mines are at the greatest risk of getting TB, but their families back home are also at risk when miners travel back and forth to work.

This satellite session, featuring African Ministers of Health, former mine workers and clips from a documentary, will present an overview of the challenges and opportunities brought about by a forthcoming Southern African Development Community Declaration on TB in the mining sector.
