Introduction - Welcome to an exciting year in seventh grade history! I look forward to providing an environment where students can expand their knowledge of world history and geography, as well as develop their language skills in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. It will be awesome.

It certainly helps that students come to class prepared and equipped to do the work assigned. However, no student will be denied access to any part of the curriculum due to an inability to afford supplies or materials. Our textbook is *Medieval and Early Modern Times*. **Course Outline** - We will be focusing on the both the Common Core Literacy Standards for History/Social Studies, as well as the seventh grade social studies standards for the state of California as students journey through the following units:

- 1. **The Fall of Rome**: We briefly review the Roman Republic, its transformation into Empire, the factors that led to its destruction, and the impact that the Roman Empire has had on the last 1,500 years of history.
- 2. **The Rise of Islam**: The world's second largest religion had its roots in seventh century Arabia. We will learn about how the religion was formed, its beliefs, its people, and how Islam impacts the world today.
- 3. **Medieval West Africa**: We will learn about the medieval kingdoms of Ghana, Mali, and Songhai, and how they contributed to the gold-salt trade that connected Europe, Africa, and southwest Asia.
- 4. **Meso-America**: We will study the art, architecture, and cultural advances of the Aztec, Maya, and Inca Empires, their interaction with European explorers, and these empires' ultimate destruction in the 16th century.
- 5. **Medieval China**: We will learn how the Q'in Dynasty helped to shape modern China, how the Mongols made their mark on Chinese history and culture, and how the Silk Road carried goods and ideas between China and Europe.
- 6. **Medieval Japan**: We will study the origins of the samurai and the bushido code. We will study feudalism in Japan and how that compared to feudalism in Medieval Europe. Finally, we will examine the rise of Buddhism in east Asia and its influence on Japanese culture.
- 7. **Medieval Europe**: We will learn what Europe was like after the fall of Rome. We will specifically focus on the transmission of knowledge and culture, the influence of the Church on life in Medieval Europe, and the transformative effect of the Black Plague.
- 8. **The Renaissance**: We will focus on the art, literature, architecture, and music of the European Renaissance. We will study how great writers and artists defined the period and incorporated influences from ancient Greece and Rome.

- 9. **The Reformation**: We will learn about the split in the Church, beginning with King Henry VIII's formation of the Church of England, and progressing with Martin Luther, John Calvin, and the beginning of the Protestant movement.
- 10. **The Age of Exploration**: We will learn about the explorers from Scandinavia, Spain, Portugal, France, the Netherlands, and England who claimed the Americas for glory, God, and gold.
- 11. **The Enlightenment and the Age of Reason**: We will learn how European thinkers such as Locke, Rousseau, Voltaire, and later American thinkers like Franklin and Jefferson inspired democratic revolutions in America and in Europe.

**Grading System** - Mr. Ippolito uses a Standards-Based Grading (SBG) system that is a blend between the grading system you are familiar with from elementary school, while transitioning into the letter grade system you will encounter in junior high and high school. With SBG, your Infinite Campus "report card" becomes a more accurate reflection of what you have truly learned in the class. Your Infinite Campus grade in my class will likely look very different than every other class. Instead of letter grades and percentages, you will see standards and a numerical level of proficiency for each standard. SBG is based on the idea that *every student learns at a different rate*. Multiple opportunities are given to take and re-take assessments until you get it right.

- An unmarked standard means we have not yet learned or assessed that standard.
- A **score of 0** means we assessed that standard, but at that time the student was absent or otherwise unable to complete the assessment.
- A score of 1 means the student has made limited progress toward mastering the standard.
- A **score of 2** means the student has demonstrated progress toward mastering the standard.
- A **score of 3** means the student has met the standard.

**So, how do I calculate my grade?** - Because we still live in a world of letter grades, we have to make your standards scores translate to a letter grade for the course.
